March 1st. Will of Elizabeth Goldshaw of Tench in the County of Stafford

After directing the payment of her debts funeral and testamentary expenses
And disposing of certain real estate not the subject of this Abstract

She gave devised and bequeathed

All her Estate right and interest of and in all these three several Messuages or Dwellinghouses hereditaments and premises with the appurtenances to the same belonging situate lying and being at Tench more in full appurtenance than ever at the respective occupations of James Dodder, William Freeman and Richard Rushton as tenants thereof

To hold the same

Unto her (testatrix's) Daughter Elizabeth Goldshaw her assigns for and during the term of her natural life (in case her (testatrix's) eldest son James Goldshaw should not return to Tench exorsided from within age in the City of Good Hope and claim or take possession of the said three several Messuages or Dwellinghouses and premises last mentioned) And from and immediately after the decease of her said Daughter

She gave devised and bequeathed the said several Messuages or Dwellinghouses hereditaments and premises with the appurtenances to the same belonging to her said Daughter's Heirs Male of Tench exorsided from and after the

The said Elizabeth Goldshaw died shortly after the date of
the said Codicil to her Will and her said Will and Codicil
were duly proved in the Consistory Court of the Bishop of
Lichfield and Coventry on the 20th day of April 1722 by
the said Elizabeth Goldshaw Spurker and Ralph Mountfort
the Executors thereof.
